FROM PAUL'S SISTER'S DIARY

The news of Paul's death was recorded in Paul's sister Dorothy's diary. She had been staying with friends near Brighton.

Thursday Feb 25th

Blanche and I went to Brighton to lunch. I have never seen such weather in England, it was just like being at the Riviera. Went in to the Metropole intending to have lunch but all the tables were taken, so we went to a humble place called Muttons close by. When we came to the part where we had to get the pistol in the office one of the attendants leant over and put her hand on me, the hand of fate, I shall never forget the movement of that hand coming down on me, it seemed to fill the world. She said you are wanted on the telephone by your father & I knew at once what that was. It seemed so supernatural the way she descended upon me. Joyce had sent me a telegram to tell me to come at once. Blanche came to the station with me & I caught the 5 something train. I wasn't at all agitated; my mind was simply a blank. I rushed into the house (Lancaster Gate, London) as quickly as I could and I saw Mother and Myfanwy. Mother's eyes were very red and so I said "Is it Paul?" & knew.

Friday Feb 26th

Life has to go on so I took Hes to the Club to go in for her life saving competition. I longed to rush up to everyone for sympathy but as a matter of fact spoke to no one."

About the service

Welcome to this Act of Commemoration.

Dawlish Town Council and Churches Together in Dawlish and District are commemorating the death in the service of the nation of every Dawlish person who was killed as a result of enemy action during the First World War.

Today we remember the death of Paul HOLMAN who died in Kemmel in Belgium on 15th April 1915.

After the First World War, it was decided that a single town War Memorial would be erected close to the parish church, and no church would have its own War Memorial. In keeping with this decision, these Acts of Commemoration take place in the town centre churches without regard to the denomination of the person they commemorate and they are led by the minister or pastor of the host church. The same Order of Service is used at each service.

There will be opportunity to talk to the leader of the service afterwards when light refreshments will be served.

Paul Holman

Paul Holman was born to Herbert (1862–1928) and Sophia Hawkes Holman (née Andrew) (1863–1933); they had six children of whom Paul was the second son. Herbert was a barrister who worked in London in the family's marine insurance business . He bought Holcombe Down as a holiday home. He became a Devon magistrate, Liberal candidate for Mid-Devon and preacher at the Wesleyan Chapel in Dawlish.

Paul's brother Herbert Leigh Holman married Vivian Hartley in December 1932 and she adopted his name as Vivien Leigh.

Paul was educated at The Leys School and Christ College Cambridge where he not only excelled in his studies, but was an ardent lover of most forms of sport. He shot in the Public Schools' team at Bisley, gained his half-blue for lacrosse, was an excellent horseman, and an amateur operatic actor of considerable attainments.

He enlisted in the Honorable Artillery Company, not waiting for a commission, and he was sent to France in September 1914, was involved in the 1st Battle of Ypres and the Battles of Ancre and Arras. He was hit by "stray shot" whilst on sentry duty outside the company billets.

The circumstances of Paul's death

A comrade wrote: "His first thought was that most evidently he must warn the guard; this he did, becoming unconscious immediately afterwards." A friend wrote that they had been able to give him a "soldier's funeral with simplicity and reverence, and with none of the hurry which is, unfortunately, frequently unavoidable, the Colonel himself reading the Service and the whole of his Section being present." The Colonel adds: "We have erected an oak cross over his grave. I can not express to you how grieved I am, as he was a splendid type of young Englishman and a fine soldier. He was greatly beloved by us all, officers and men."
