Obituary.

The funeral of the late Pte G E Rundell, 9th Batt. Somerset Light Infantry, only son of Mr and Mrs J Rundell, of 3 Sea Lawn, who died at the Wareham Military Hospital, took place at Dawlish on Wedne day afternoon. The remains were conveyed from Wareham to Dawlish by train on Monday. Full military honours were accorded deceased, the Battalion band, playing the Dead March in Saul, and a detachment from his company escorting the remains to the station. As the train steamed away three volleys were fired by the military escort.

The burial service was conducted by the Revs. W P Alford (vicar) and H C Pratt. The chief mourners were Mr J Rundell (father) and Miss Rundell and Miss M Rundell (aunts). The beautiful floral

tributes were as follows :-

Mr and Mrs Rundell have received a gracious message of sympathy from the King and Queen, signed by Lord Kitchener.

Lieut.-Col. E H Swayne, C.O., of the Battalion, wrote to Mr and Mrs Rundell expressing the sincere regret on behalf of himself and all ranks in the loss they had sustained. He adds: "I may say that Pte. Rundell was a promising young soldier,

clean, tidy, intelligent, and eager to learn."

Amongst other messages of sympathy was a letter from Mr Gardement, manager of the Yeovil branch of the Capital and Counties Bank (at which deceased was a clerk prior to joining up), expressing his exceeding sorrow and speaking in high terms of the late Mr G E Rundell as a most reliable and keen official.
